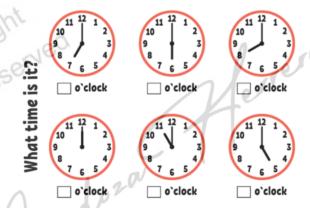

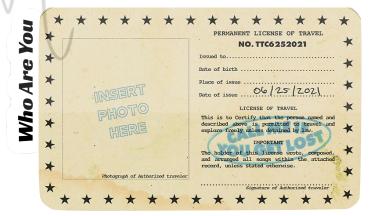

orders, commands, instructions, and directions. It is formed using the base form of the verb, without a subject. For example, "Sit down," "Open your book," or "Listen carefully." Imperatives can be direct or polite depending on tone and context. Adding "please" makes a command more polite, such as "Please close the door." Imperatives are common in classrooms, recipes, signs, and instructions. We use imperatives to give orders, directions and to make requests. To sound more polite, you can add the word please at the end or at the beginning of the sentence.
